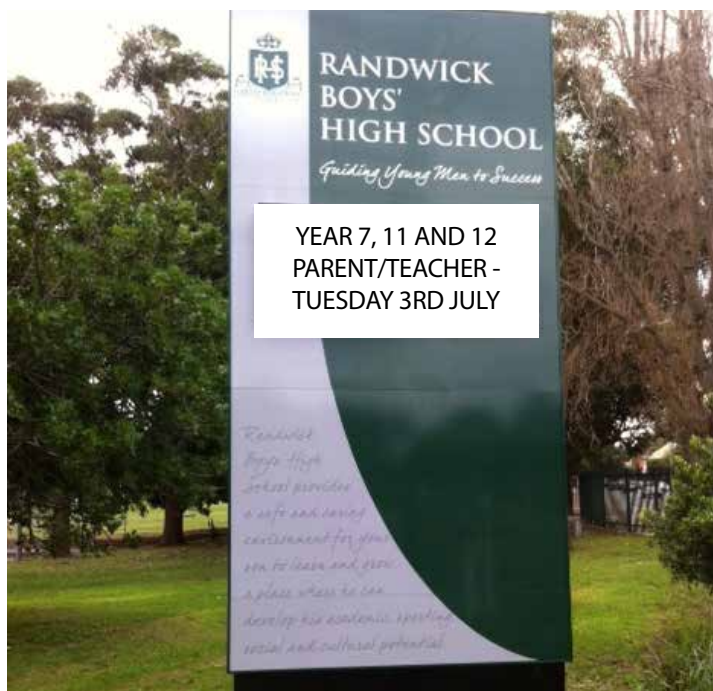

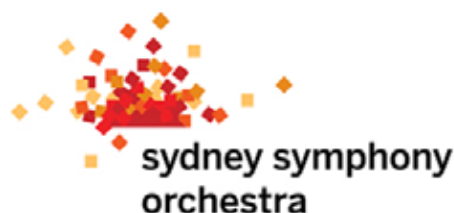

'Cast by the Storm' screening

On the morning of Tuesday, 19th of June, and during Refugee Week, a group of students from Years 11 and 12 Legal Studies classes attended an Australian based film, 'Cast from the Storm', by director David Mason. The film intends to encapsulate the experiences of three south-west Sydney teenagers, Asfar, Maryam and Wiam, as they try to resettle in Australia after having fled their war-torn countries.

We were excited to share the perspectives of teenagers who had come to Australia as refugees and asylum seekers. When the time came, we were directed into the cinema, along with a few other schools from the surrounding area. Before long, the lights dimmed and the projection lit up. The film focused on a small group of high school students, much like ourselves in a way, as they tried to demonstrate the hardships they had faced resettling in Australia. The program Treehouse Theatre, an after-school drama group, helps students process trauma and shape their history into onstage performances. These teenagers were able to accurately portray the experiences they had undertaken at such an early age. It followed their journey as they prepared to perform their series of small theatrical pieces representing each of the teenagers' memories and personal trauma. The film itself was only around 70 minutes in length; however, it was as though it had expressed a lifetime of ordeals and sacrifices in the dream of starting a better life, a life taken for granted by many Australians.



After watching the film, we were allowed 15 minutes to eat some food. We discussed the extremity of events and the emotional toll that it would have had on these teenagers. After eating, Ms Harris led our group to the bus stop, where we then caught a bus back to school for the commencement of lunch. All in all, I was blown away by the courage of the young people and their ability to speak about their stories in front of strangers. It really allowed me to realise the hardships that refugees endure.

Computer keyboard skills

Typing Tournament may be accessed from home or school and comprises self-paced modules with drills, exercises, fun games, speed-accuracy tests and progress charts.

In this digital age most high school, TAFE & university students complete assessment tasks using a word processor, while educational institutions are increasingly using online tests and assessments, e.g. NAPLAN & VALID.

A student with a two-finger typing speed of 5-7 wpm (words per minute) is severely disadvantaged compared to a student who can manage a smooth 20-30 wpm. The USA educational standard for high school students is 40 wpm.

RBHS turn the tide against rivals

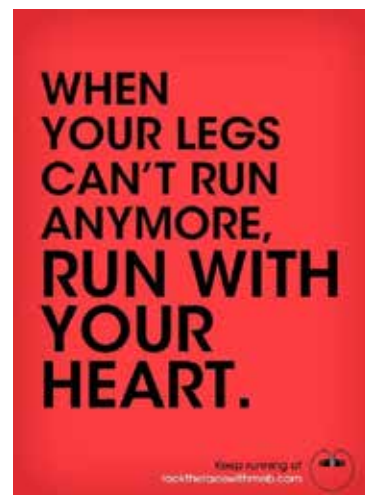

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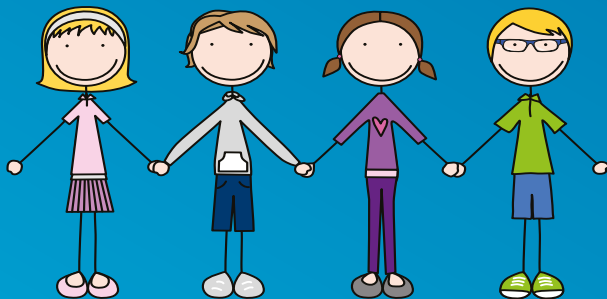

Shack Tutoring Program Term 3 & 4 August – October 2018

The Shack tutoring program is a cost free tutoring service for students from Year 6 – Year 12. The program is run by The Shack Youth Services in conjunction with the University of NSW and has been operating since 1996.

To meet the requirements of this program:

- Students need to be either living or going to school in the Randwick/Botany council area
- Students are unable to access private tutoring due to financial hardship

How does it work?

- You will need to complete the attached enrolment form and either email, post or dropped off at The Shack between the enrolment period
- You will be matched with a volunteering UNSW student who is able to tutor you in the subject/s, day and time you have nominated
- You will meet your tutor after school at the UNSW for one hour one day a week
- The tutoring program runs in line of the UNSW semesters and does not run during school holidays and university exams
- On your first tutoring lesson, you will exchange mobile numbers with your tutor so if you are away for your lesson you can contact your tutor direct. Otherwise you are able to email or contact Shack Tutoring
- Failure to attend 3 consecutive lessons without communication will result in your removal from the program
- You are responsible for bringing your materials to each lesson such as text books, calculator, paper and pens
- We endeavour to match every student with a tutor but is not guaranteed
- Program information, advice and updates are communicated through email therefore it is essential to include an email address on your enrolment form
- Any late enrolments will automatically be put on a waiting list

Two tower cranes have been erected, and Ganellen will be using these for moving materials inside the site boundary.

We have had our first major concrete pour, and it went considerably well. The location of the concrete pump was considered carefully and the resultant noise levels at the boundaries were low.

Note that we are expecting to commence infrastructure works towards the South Western zone of the site (West of Young St) in the coming weeks. These works are for the construction of new roads, and installation of in-ground services, including sewer and water, stormwater drainage, and electrical infrastructure. Note that these works are expected to be completed in the 3rd quarter of 2019. We will be providing regular notices with specific updates on traffic changes.

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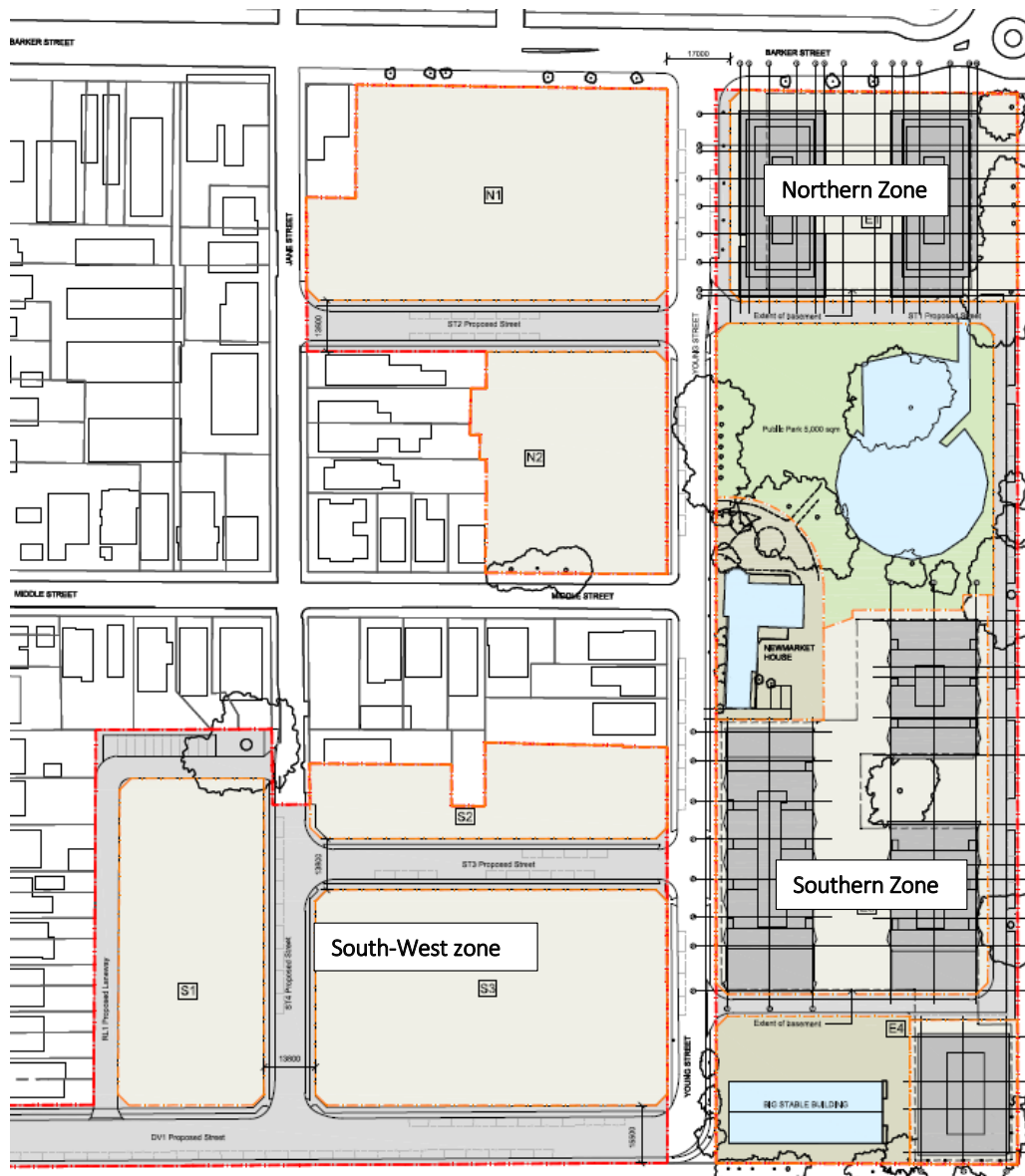

A glimpse from the past - Pegasus 1970 page 46

ARION

The ship landed on the newest planet yet discovered, Arion, of the star-system Telos. The men, if so they were, waited inside. "The Manual" stated that they should stay inside for at least twelve hours, waiting and watching. Any transgressions meant death.

The automatic camera would take the pictures of any animal within a two-hundred yard radius of the ship. At the same time, a picture would flash on the screen inside, stay there for at least five minutes, while a bell would ring as a warning until it was turned off.

Nothing stirred for an hour. A game of chess was in progress. The Ex-Pilot and the Engineer were considered the two best chess players in the ship's complement of over fifty and these two were engaged in a close tussle, with the latter in the slightly better position.
