



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

HSC Minimum Standard Online Tests - Year 10, 2019

Every student in NSW is being supported to meet a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the HSC from 2020.

Students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show they meet the standard students need to achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online reading, writing and numeracy test.



From 2020, only students who meet the HSC minimum standard will receive a Higher School Certificate testamur. Students do not need to meet the HSC minimum standard to:

study HSC courses

sit HSC exams

receive HSC assessment and exam results

receive an ATAR

receive a Record of School Achievement.

Students have two opportunities a year in Years 10, 11 or 12 to pass any tests needed. They will also be able to take them for a few years after they leave school.





HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

You need reading, writing and maths skills for everyday life after school. This why you are required to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.



To make sure you have the basics right, and show you meet the minimum standard, you need to pass short online tests of everyday reading, writing and maths skills.

- The tests will be available to take at school up to twice a year in Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12, and even after the HSC.
- Sample questions and answers are available online, as well as practice tests and advice from students who have completed the tests.
- Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.
- You do not need to sit the reading, writing or numeracy online test(s) if you achieved Band 8 or above in the respective 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN test(s).

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Some students with disabilities will be eligible for extra provisions for the online tests, or an exemption. Talk to your teachers to determine whether you are eligible for provisions. A Disability Provisions, Exemptions and Appeals policy is available on the NESA website.

Time Management - Using a Term Planner

The School's Assessment Team has designed four templates for students to use as a term planner. Each template is based on a school term. A term planner is a record of important dates for the term related to your study. It allows you to keep track of what pieces of assessment are due and how much they are worth at one glance. It can help you to manage your time more effectively by allowing you to identify your peak study load times so that you can make sure that you have plenty of time to get all your assignments done. These four templates are available on the school's website for you to download and use.

Follow these steps to use your term planner effectively:

1. At the start of each year, you will be given a course outline for each of your subjects which should detail what pieces of assessment are required for that subject, how much they are worth and when they are due. Put this information into your term planner. Write the exact week or dates that they are due. For example:



- 2. From this overview you can see when your busy times are going to be. Use this information to determine when you will begin work on a piece of assessment. For example, with five pieces of assessment due within a three-week period, it would be sensible for this student to plan to begin work on some, or all, of these pieces of assessment several weeks before they are due. These start dates can be marked on the planner.
- 3. Knowing how much each piece of assessment is worth will help you to determine how much time to spend on it. For example, it doesn't make sense to allocate three weeks to prepare an assignment worth 20% and only one week to prepare a major project worth 60%.
- 4. List other important dates and activities on your term planner. If there are important events coming up (eg. a wedding, family visit) put these into your planner. This helps help you identify if you have assessment due around that same time so you to plan to start it earlier.
- 5. Once you have completed your term planner put it somewhere where you can see it easily (eg. above your regular study area, taped to the front of your main study folder). It's of no use to you if it's hidden under a pile of papers or tucked into the back of a diary.
- 6. Refer to it frequently so that no piece of assessment just 'sneaks up' on you. Also, you may need to update your term planer occasionally as some assessment dates may change. Check with your teacher often.

What we heard on whether Randwick Boys High School should transition to being a co-educational school

From 10 December 2018 until 15 February 2019 the NSW Department of Education undertook a consultation process to seek feedback on what communities in Sydney's eastern suburbs thought about the proposal to transition Randwick Boys High School (RBHS) to being a co-educational school.

During this time an online survey was available for community members to complete. Importantly, the survey was not a polling exercise, and the views of multiple interest groups were also considered.

There was a dedicated email address for those wishing to make comments, which received almost 100 comments from the public and membership groups who were not

able to represent their members' views through the survey. Senior departmental officers also met with representatives of key stakeholder groups.

In addition, information booths were held across the eastern suburbs and 40 schools received school gate visits to promote the survey and consultation in general.

During the consultation process:



2,226 people completed the survey



1,505 people made comments in the survey about what should be considered if RBHS did transition to being a coeducational school



Over 6000 postcards were handed out to the local community to promote information about the survey and the @ Randwick email address



96 emails were received at the @Randwick email address



40 NSW public schools in Sydney's eastern suburbs were visited at the school gate by a community engagement team to promote the survey to the school community



13 schools received a second visit from the engagement team to promote the survey, at the request of school Principals



Five information booths were held for a total of 30 hours at local shopping centres during January and February 2019



Over 150 people engaged in conversation directly through the community information booths



Posters and postcards advertising the engagement campaign were displayed at libraries and aquatic centres across Waverly, Woollahra and Randwick Councils

Summary of community sentiment

Table 1 presents the level of support expressed by survey respondents to the question of whether RBHS should transition to a co-educational school.

Overall, 1,478 respondents to the survey (or 66.4% of respondents to the question) expressed support for the proposal.

After careful consideration of stakeholder and community views, and considering related policy issues the Department has decided that RBHS will not become a co-educational school.

Despite the fact that the overall survey response supported the proposal for RBHS to become a co-educational school, there were deeper concerns among local stakeholders and representative interest groups that needed to be weighed against general sentiment. These issues are outlined




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Interpreting levels of **support** for the proposal

While 66% of survey respondents either strongly supported or supported the proposal:





Of particular interest, parents/carers of girls represented 1,183 respondents.

While the greater majority (n=781) either strongly supported or supported the proposal only 140 of these people were parents of girls at RGHS.

These results show that of the 2,226 respondents to the survey, the level of support among people who would be immediately affected by the change needs to be carefully weighed against overall sentiment.

Consideration of comments

In addition to the qualitative comments gathered through the survey respondents, the consultation team also received 96 emails from community members and stakeholder groups. The majority of these additional comments to the survey were received via individual community members. There was also a range of emails sent on behalf of a stakeholder, community or school groups, including:

- Randwick Boys High School P&C
- Randwick Girls High School P&C
- Staff and students from Randwick Girls High School including the Student Representative Council (SRC)

- NSW Secondary Principals Council
- NSW Teachers Federation
- Teachers Federation members at South Sydney High School, Matraville Sports High School and JJ Cahill Memorial High School
- CLOSEast

Comments were received from a number of schools in the eastern suburbs – from staff, parents and school executive. These comments were considered along with survey responses.

Interpreting **feedback** from representative stakeholder groups



Qualitative feedback from representative groups highlighted a variety of positions on the proposal. Groups, such as the NSW Teachers Federation and NSW Secondary Principals Council opposed the proposal and raised important issues that justify deeper consideration.



Advocacy group, **CLOSEast supported** the proposal, and noted that it provided greater choice in education options in the area. In contrast, the **NSW Secondary Principals** Council noted that the proposal would reduce choice for single sex education in the area and was concerned about the impact that transitioning RBHS to being a coeducational school would have on enrolment numbers in surrounding schools.



Stakeholder comments generally highlighted that more preparation for the consultation process would have strengthened the level of engagement and called for further consultation should the proposal be considered

for adoption.

Issues raised by stakeholders to be considered if RBHS did transition to a co-educational school

An effective and sensitive change management approach tailored for students, parents/carers and teachers.

Consideration of how to make RBHS a welcoming school for girls, both in terms of culture, infrastructure and overall approach to teaching and learning.

Professional support for teachers to adjust to the change and to modify teaching methods.

Broader concerns about the lack of choice for public boys-only secondary education in the eastern suburbs if RBHS transitions to being a coeducational school.







Concerns raised by groups that opposed the proposal

Groups that opposed the proposal included Teachers Federation members at South Sydney High School, Matraville Sports High School and JJ Cahill Memorial High School. Other groups included Randwick Girls High School P&C Executive and Randwick Girls High School Executive staff. Key concerns included:

Removing choice of public boys schools in the eastern suburbs. Desire to maintain RGHS as a stand-alone girls school, which is a direct reflection of perceptions that RGHS would be consolidated with a co-ed RBHS. There is already capacity in other co-educational high schools in close proximity to RBHS. This does not justify making RBHS co-educational.

NEXT STEPS

After considering the range of views gained through the consultation period, the Department has decided that RBHS will remain as a boys-only high school.

The Department will develop a strategy to support all the public secondary schools in the eastern suburbs, and will retain all existing schooling options to give parents and students choice.
