Brother John Taylor Memorial Prize

Congratulations to Randwick Boys' High School 2021 Higher School Certificate student, Jayden Huynh, who was awarded the Brother John Taylor Memorial Prize in a special ceremony at NSW Parliament House on Tuesday, 12 April 2022. The prize comprises a cash grant, a trophy and a certificate recognising the award.

Jayden was one of two 2021 HSC students awarded the prestigious prize for overcoming significant personal adversity to achieve top marks in his HSC. He is now studying Mechanical Engineering at University of NSW with aspirations to become a racing-car designer.

The Brother John Taylor Memorial Prize is presented each year to students who have overcome significant hardship to attain academic excellence in their HSC. The award, first presented in 1993, was established in memory of Brother John Taylor who made a significant contribution to education in NSW.

Brother John was a renowned senior educationalist who made his mark on NSW education as a Christian Brother, teacher, principal and Executive Director of Catholic Education. He was a valued member of education boards, including the Board of Studies NSW from its inception until his death in 1993.

Brother John was known for his commitment, strong principles and integrity, and worked tirelessly for excellence in education. To acknowledge his lifelong dedication to education and his commitment to the ideals of equity, the Memorial Prize recognises outstanding academic achievement by students despite disability or other disadvantage.

The Brother John Taylor Memorial Prize is administered by trustees representing NESA, Catholic Schools NSW, NSW Department of Education and the Association of Independent Schools NSW.

WHY JOIN THE P&C?



Whether your family is new to the school or you've been here for years, getting involved in the P&C is a great way to support your child's education and have fun! Our P&C meetings are a great chance to hear directly from the Principal, Mr Raskall, members of the school's Executive Team, and teachers about what is happening in the school. We also have guest speakers from outside organisations to help keep us informed about education-wide and school-specific developments that may impact us.

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RBHS-Year 9 Numeracy Day – Tuesday of Week 2B, 03 May 2022

Organisation:

On Tuesday Term 2, Week 2, all students in Year 9 will participate in the planned Numeracy Day from period 1 to period 5. You will attend your normal lessons with your teachers as per timetable, but each lesson will have a numeracy focus. For the day, make sure you have your calculator, ruler, protractor and other equipment you would normally use in calculations, graphing, mapping and data interpretation.

Purpose:

- To improve the 5 Focus Areas, as per table below.
- Develop numeracy skills across the curriculum and enhance NAPLAN results in Year 9
- To promote awareness of the importance of numeracy amongst Year 9 students.
- To further promote numeracy across all KLA's.
- To implement further numeracy teaching strategies into our Year 9 programs.

Numeracy is a fundamental component of learning across all areas of the curriculum.

What is numeracy?

- To be numerate is to use **mathematical ideas** effectively to participate in daily life and **make sense of the** world
- It incorporates the use of numerical, spatial, graphical, statistical and algebraic concepts and skills in a variety
 of contexts and involves the critical evaluation, interpretation, application and communication of
 mathematical information in a range of practical situations.
- Numeracy involves students recognising and understanding the role of mathematics in many contexts.
- It involves choosing the mathematics to use, applying mathematical skills and evaluating their use to solve problems in the world around us.
- Highly numerate students **interpret**, **apply and evaluate** mathematical strategies, and communicate mathematical reasoning in **real world situations**.

What is the difference between mathematics and numeracy?

- In **Mathematics** the emphasis is usually on understanding mathematical concepts (such as numeric calculations and statistical data)
- With numeracy, the emphasis is on the use of quantitative, spatial and measurement skills and chance concepts as they apply to everyday activities such as shopping or reading a newspapers

Focus Area	Description
1	Mental computation and numerical reasoning
	A student identifies mathematical information, understands numbers, calculates, estimates and solves problems
2	Patterns and algebraic reasoning
	A student identifies patterns, develops algebraic reasoning and makes generalisations
3	Spatial visualisation, geometric reasoning and mapping
	A student understands and applies concepts of 2D shapes and 3D objects, angles and position
4	Measurement and time calculations
	A student applies measurement strategies and understands time
5	Graphical representation and data analysis
	A student represents and interprets data in graphs, tables and diagrams





NAPLAN Online information for students 2022

In Week 3 Term 2, Year 7 and 9 students will complete their NAPLAN Online tests. From Tuesday-Friday, students will complete one exam per day. Year 9 will complete exams during period 1 and 2, Year 7 period 3 and 4.

Equipment needed:

Bring a pen or a pencil.

Bring your own headphones if you have them, otherwise headphones will be provided.

NAPLAN – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit in May each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students do.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools are transitioning from paper-based to computer-based assessments. Most schools will complete NAPLAN tests online in 2022. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students can participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experience of using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.









What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN online test window is nine days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN online test window starts on Tuesday 10 May and finishes on Friday 20 May 2022. Tests must be scheduled as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Online NAPLAN test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au

National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

Parent/carer consent for exemption or withdrawal

The results of the National Assessment Program tests provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and are used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's achievement is reported against the national reporting bands, national averages and national minimum standard.

Consideration for exemption can be given to students:

- newly arrived in Australia (less than a year before the test) and with a language background other than English
- with significant intellectual and/or functional disability.

Exemption must be discussed with the school Principal. Reasons for exemption must be provided by the school.

Students may also be withdrawn from the test at the request of the parent/carer.
