

A glimpse from the past - Pegasus 1965

ON SURFING

A. E. JOHNSTONE, B.A.

(From Headmaster's Address, School Speech Night, 1964)

I was recently provoked into some thought by a reported article in a London magazine called "The New Statesman" which said that Australian surfing has grown into a huge commercial industry catering to an "unhealthy" cult and that Australia's present religion of the beach has developed into a new teenage sub-culture. "It is a rather frightening example of a nation particularly prone to acting out a manufactured image."

This article, which in many ways seems to be inaccurate and exaggerated, contains some elements of truth. There is a "hooligan-fringe" associated with the surf, as there is with many sporting activities. Many young people do have a tendency to initiate each other in their outlooks, their actions and their fashions and place a false emphasis on the importance of conformity so that they will not be considered different. This tendency is a characteristic attitude of the insecurity of youth and, as the young become more secure in themselves, the necessity to imitate fades in its importance.

The beach and the surf are a part of our wonderful national heritage and "The New Statesman" looks at the bad aspects rather than at the healthy recreational values that exist.

My opinion, especially from an educational point of view, is that we should use our beaches wisely. Health, recreation, sunshine, good companionship are there if we choose to find them. However, being a student is not an easy responsibility and therefore beach in excess is most unwise. A schoolboy cannot tie himself too closely with surf club activities, although it is good to belong to one. He must not imitate the actions and outlook of older men, especially those of the irresponsible variety. He cannot ride a board every afternoon after school and then expect to get any value out of his study period at night. He cannot spend a whole week-end in the surf and then expect to learn during the school week. I most strongly advocate beach moderation in every way.

Too many academic failures are associated with fatigue arising from unwise surfing activities; association with unsuitable types of companions w

ill result in many types of social and moral problems. I hope the student will both enjoy and greatly benefit from the coming surfing season, yet may I warm him to carefully watch his own activities, and to watch even more carefully the activities of his companions.
