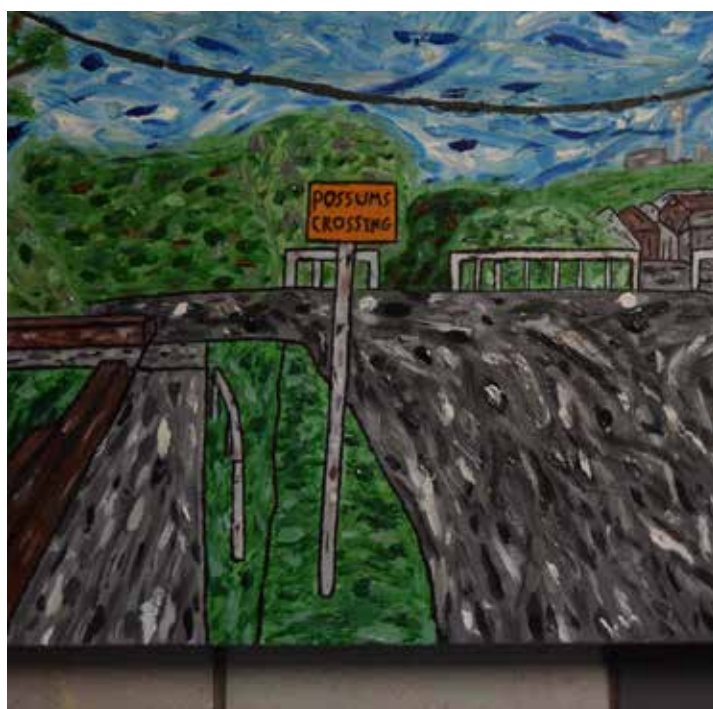

Reporting on the Honour Roll

The RBHS Honour Roll is an acknowledgement to many of the students who previously attended Randwick Boys' Superior School who served in WWI. Some of the students on the honour roll died in combat and others returned in various circumstances, but each individual differed. The students in Year 10 Elective History have each been researching and investigating one of the old boys from the list. We individually picked a name and then began looking into finding the person we were looking for, until we created a profile for the person.

The method we took to research our person was to first go over physically to the honour roll and transcribe one of the names from the board, trying to get the spelling completely correct to ensure we can find them. After that we looked for records of them on the Australian War Memorial, by using just the name and geographic location to try and verify once we have found them. After we had confirmed we found them (or we found the person who is the closest match to them) we then recorded any relevant information about them. We then continued to dig for information by searching for the person in the National Archives of Australia with any more information to help narrow down the search. We also followed any links we could to try and discover any extra information on our chosen individual.

The original name I had transcribed was one W. H. Tollis, quite a unique name for the time. I first had to confirm if I found the correct individual in the War Memorial records; however, this proved impossible as the information did not specifically line up with any of the people being involved with Randwick Superior School. The closest I could find was a John Henry Tollis (his name lined up closest to the original initials) living on 61 Garden-street, Alexandria, Sydney, NSW. Coincidentally, there were two others with the surname Tollis who lived in Alexandria, but their initials did not line up as well. Interestingly enough, they were all unrelated according to the records, which is odd, considering it is a very unique name with a large percentage of the people claiming the name living in the same suburb! Before joining the war he was employed as a tailor's cutter, and he lived with his mother as he had only just left school. Based on the information, he was religious, being a Congregationalist Christian.

Tollis enlisted in the army at approximately age 18 and a half sometime in September 1915, before embarking from Sydney on 11 December on the RMS Mooltan. By 19 February 1916 Tollis had been trained as a reinforcement, likely before embarking, and joined the 12th Reinforcements being 'taken on strength' in Egypt. He embarked on 22 March from Alexandria until arriving in Marseilles just under a week later. He then would have taken the train inland towards the French front joining the 1st Battalion. However, on the way to the front he was absent from a parade, which was considered a crime, and he was awarded a week confined to barracks. Presumably he joined up with the rest of the 1st Battalion by this point, and they ended up fighting in the battle of Pozière, being the first major involvement of the 1st Battalion in France. Interestingly, as I was writing this I found that one of the first units of the 1st Battalion was formed in Randwick, Sydney, in August 1914, which was located geographically close to the current position of RBHS, and was likely where Tollis

was first sent before being sent overseas, and it may also suggest that he is indeed the original W. H. Tollis, although we may never know for sure. Sadly, this battle ended up being his last, as he was killed in action somewhere in Pozière Heights, and he was thought to have died between 22-25 July. Below is a map of Pozières, where Tollis died in battle somewhere in this area. Over the course of his military career he gained the rank of private, and earned 5 shillings per diem, after serving for both the 12th Reinforcements and the 1st Battalion. He died in a battle that led to eventual Australian victory, and served his country with all he had.

This research task was an interesting yet challenging task, as it required the use of complex systems to try and discover the person you're looking for, and pushed your understanding to try and create links to confirm whether you had the right person, and to create a coherent narrative of who they were. Overall though it was very interesting to find links and coincidences that reminds us all what a small world it truly can be, and I think it's a wonderful thing to remember and acknowledge those who fought for the good of Australia so that we may live the way we do now.

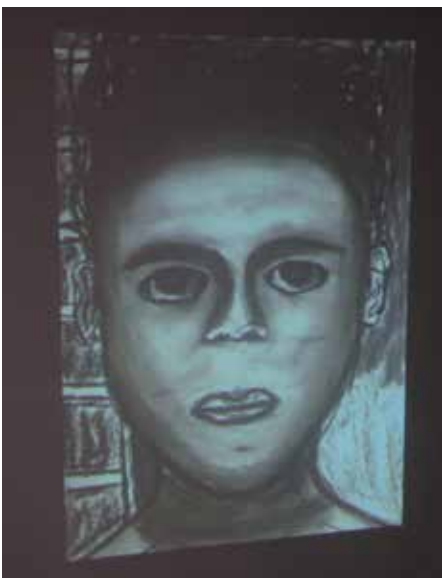

Investing in our schools

We are upgrading Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School to provide modern facilities and improve educational outcomes for the school community. The delivery of these projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students.

The upgrade to Randwick Boys High School will deliver upgraded science labs, a Fitness Learning Hub and new Technology and Applied Sciences (TAS) facilities.

The upgrade to Randwick Girls High School will deliver refurbished TAS facilities, a new woodwork learning workshop, enhanced library facilities and an administration reconfiguration that involves relocating the school entry.

In addition to the upgrades, other improvements will be made to both campuses including toilet facilities, roof replacements, power supply, enhancements to the halls and upgrades to movement areas including covered walkways.

Progress summary

In the 2018/19 Budget, the NSW Government announced planning funding to investigate a potential upgrade to Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School. This included analysis of demographic trends and the school community needs, conducting site investigations to assess the condition of existing buildings and surroundings, and transport studies and site due diligence.

As part of this planning, in 2019 the NSW Department of Education considered reclassifying Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School into a co-educational facility. However after careful consideration of educational needs across the local school network and following consultation with department stakeholders, this model was not pursued.

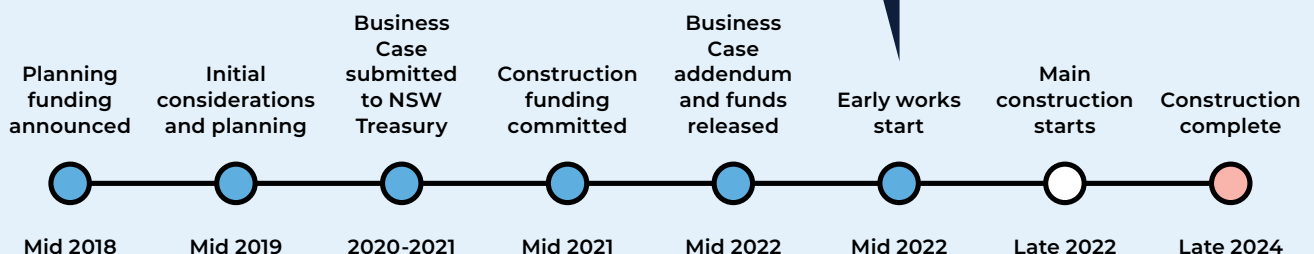
A Final Business Case for upgrades to the schools was developed in 2020 and submitted to NSW Treasury in early 2021 for funding consideration. In July 2021, the NSW Government announced funding for upgrades at Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School.

The 2021/22 NSW Budget allocated funding to deliver new and upgraded learning spaces to support the curriculum being provided at the schools. The allocation and scope of the projects reflects the Eastern Suburbs School Community Group (SCG) enrolment projections following the opening of new and upgraded secondary schools in the wider local area.

The upgrades at Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School will improve the study environment for students, facilitate educational growth through the provision of specialist teaching and learning spaces, and upgrade core facilities.

Early works construction started in July 2022 and will continue in a series of refurbishment works across both schools for the next two years.

Timeline



What is being delivered?

The new upgrades to Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School will:

- improve the learning environment for students,
- facilitate educational growth through the provision of specialist teaching and learning spaces, and
- upgrade core facilities.

The department's Asset Management Unit will deliver the projects to both Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School. The delivery approach will be staged over the next two years to ensure both schools remain fully operational during construction and to minimise impact to teaching and learning. All work will be planned in consultation with school leadership to ensure teacher and student needs are prioritised.

The upgrade to Randwick Boys High School will deliver:

- Power supply upgrade
- Upgraded science labs (Buildings E and F).
- An indoor and outdoor Fitness Learning Hub utilising an existing general learning space (Building D).
- New Technology and Applied Sciences (TAS) food technology facilities (Building G).
- Covered walkway to the hall

The upgrade to Randwick Girls High School will deliver:

- Refurbished Technology and Applied Sciences (TAS) food technology facilities including Vocational Education and Training (VET) standard kitchens (Building A).
- New woodwork learning workshop (Building A).
- Refurbished administration area (Building B) and relocation of school entry.
- Upgraded library facilities including the provision of a new mezzanine level (Building C).
- Covered walkway upgrades.

NSW Department of Education – School Infrastructure

What are the next steps?

School Infrastructure NSW is working with the leadership of Randwick Boys High School and Randwick Girls High School to prioritise the work plan and has appointed an architect to finalise the designs.

The Asset Management Unit will prioritise works that may be able to be delivered by Day 1 Term 1 2023. This includes the Fitness Learning Hub at Randwick Boys High School, and the woodwork learning workshop at Randwick Girls High School. These works are anticipated to start in late 2022. More information will be provided before work starts on these areas.

Thank you for your patience and understanding. We will keep the community informed as the project progresses.

Frequently asked questions

What works are underway at Randwick Girls and Randwick Boys High Schools?

Early works have started at Randwick Girls High School to upgrade existing student amenity.

Early works currently underway at Randwick Boys High School include an upgrade to the existing school hall, including a new floor and painting.

What communications will be provided to parents/careers to keep up to date with the progress of the project?

We will provide regular project updates and works notifications to the school community as construction for the upgrades continue.

When will construction for the upgrades start?

Early work is underway. Main construction works are anticipated to start in late 2022.

How will you ensure public safety during construction?

The safety of the school's students, staff, visitors and the local community is our highest priority. Construction planning will be designed so there is minimal impact on school operations. Safety measures will be in place to separate the construction site from areas occupied by the school to ensure students are unable to enter construction areas. There will be regular consultation with the school to plan work and discuss construction progress.

NETWORK NEIGHBOUR

Dear Sydney Light Rail Network Neighbour

To improve network safety, service reliability and reduce the need for ongoing maintenance, Transdev Sydney, operator of Sydney's light rail network will be undertaking various track maintenance activities on the network **between 11pm and 5am, Monday 29 August to Thursday 1 September 2022.**

Noise and traffic impacts

Between 11pm and 5am, Monday 29 August to Thursday 1 September 2022:

- Residents and retailers may hear noise associated with the use of vehicles, cranes, generators and tools to complete the work.
- Work may take place on adjacent footpaths, at intersections, on cross streets and side streets around the area.
- Floodlights may be used and will be directed away from residential areas.
- Workers may access the site before and after the works period to set-up and remove equipment.
- While workers will park their vehicles inside the rail corridor where possible, be aware that on-street parking may be limited near the worksite.

The NSW Environment Protection Authority will be notified of these works.

Light rail service changes

From 9pm to 1am, Monday 29 August to Wednesday 31 August:

- L2 Randwick Line and L3 Kingsford Line light rail services will not run due to planned maintenance and trackwork.
- Use alternative transports:
 - Trains or walk between Circular Quay and Central Chalmers Street,
 - Replacement buses between Central Chalmers Street and Randwick or Juniors Kingsford.

L2 and L3 Lines light rail services will resume daily from 5am to 9pm, between Circular Quay and Randwick or Juniors Kingsford.
