












From the Prinicpal




look forward to their big plans being put into practice!

Challenges are set in the following disciplines: The Arts, Language Literature, Social Sciences and STEM.

Reporting on the Honour Roll

The RBHS Honour Roll is a commemorative board filled with the names from Randwick Superior School (Randwick Boys' predecessor) of the students and teachers who fought in the tragic Great War. We students in 10 Extension History have been assigned to choose a name from the Honour Roll and research further into the individual we have chosen.

We started by writing the name of the individual we had chosen. I chose Francis George Wootton. Wootton was a part of the 30th Infantry Battalion which saw battle on the Western Front. Such notable battles they fought in were the Somme, Amiens and the Kaiserschlacht, the last-ditch German spring offensive. After that we researched further into our individual by using the Australian War Memorial website (www.awm.gov.au) and the National Archives, which include all the information and all former documents this individual signed or had relating to him. In these archives there were documents where the individual had signed to get into the army, a list of injuries suffered if any at all, and if they had returned home safely or were sadly killed in action.

I first had to establish whether I had the correct record. Unfortunately, I couldn't find out whether this was the right person or not. There were only four people who had the name/alias 'F. Wootton'. I came to this conclusion by his place of residence, in Darlinghurst, which was the closest geographic position to Randwick.

I also discovered he did attend his guard duty on two occasions and was not allowed to receive his pay for two days. He was also fined for this.

Fortunately, he survived the war, albeit after being sent to the hospital a couple of times. First, he suffered from a severe case of trench foot. Then he suffered from a shrapnel wound, and before being discharged and returned to Australia, he suffered from gunshot wounds in both arms.

This task was interesting, because I learned about a foot soldier who I have never heard of before, and the many things a soldier from Australia had to endure.
