Author of the Month

Welcome to another edition of "Author of the Month". This month's author is Matthew Johnstone.

Matthew Johnstone completed a diploma in Fine Arts, but then changed course and went to have 15 successful years as a creative in advertising. Since then, he has published a total of 9 books (including 1 lateral thinking book and 1 kid's book). The other 7 are mental health and wellbeing books, most of which have gone on to become bestsellers locally and abroad.

Matthew's company develops various creative and educational programs and illustrations on understanding mental health; and resilience for schools, communities, eHealth and workplaces. Matthew spends much of his time in the professional orbit of the leaders in mental health and wellbeing arena, such as the World Health Organisation, the Black Dog Institute, The Golden Door Elysia and Geelong Grammar, to name a few.

In 2018, he was a finalist in the Australia Mental Health Award.

Matthew's work has been endorsed by Stephen Fry, Edward de Bono and the World Health Organisation.

Matthew lives in Sydney with his wife, 2 daughters and his dog, Cookie.

Year 10 Marine Studies Water Research Laboratories

Students from Y10 Marine Studies visited the Water Research Laboratory at Manly Vale on Tuesday as part of their study in Marine and Civil Engineering, the research facility forms part of the School of Civil and Environmental Engineering at UNSW.



The aim of this excursion is to expose our students to the latest research in coastal and hydrological management, and our students were led by the Principal Engineer of the facility - Ben Modra. Students were introduced to the latest research activities of the Laboratory by the PhD students at the facility and they were shown the latest research in sand erosion, fish-way, dam monitoring, coastal survey and wave mitigation.





It was unfortunate the visit to the near-by Mermaid Pool was cancelled due to unfavourable weather, but students were able to visit the Manly Dam and observed the use of the dam as a recreational facility after its decommission as a portable water source.
